Last Meeting

In April we enjoyed a talk by Professor Rebecca Probert about **'Marriage law and practice in the Midlands, 1837-1900'**. The facility of online meetings had opened the meeting up to all MA members and non-members and the talk saw 82 people join us from as far afield as Dublin, Jersey and Australia.

Rebecca explained The Marriage Act 1836, when the possibility of marrying in a registered place of worship or register office, brought Jewish and Quaker weddings within a new legal framework, and introduced a system of civil registration for all marriages.

Of equal value to the content of Rebecca's talk was the Q&A session afterwards, during which she patiently took many questions on various marriage-related matters, always with a ready answer, often fulsome and fact-filled. She is an excellent speaker and hope to find a reason to get her back one day!



This Month's Meeting

The Blind Postmaster General & the Suffragist by Alan D Godfrey FRPSL. *"The story of the lives of Henry Fawcett MP and his wife Millicent Garrett Fawcett. Henry was blinded at age 25, but went on to become a reforming Liberal MP and PMG. He introduced many innovations at the Post Office. Millicent was leader of the 50,000 strong NUWSS and was mainly responsible for obtaining votes for women in 1918."*

Find My Past: 1921 Census Update

Findmypast says it is committed to providing users with the best possible experience and will be launching the 1921 Census in full in early 2022. The British brand, along with its partners at The National Archives and ONS, is still hopeful for a January launch, although progress has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Earlier in 2020 lockdown restrictions led to a three-month complete shutdown of the project, and while operations were back up and running as soon as permitted, the subsequent need to work at a much-reduced staffing capacity has affected project timelines.

The ongoing need for social distancing, within the confines of the project's requirements, means that while Findmypast is 'doing everything possible to limit the impact of COVID-19', this valuable work is still being conducted in a highly changeable environment

Findmypast says it is still on track for a full online release in early 2022 although an exact launch date is yet to be announced.
