THE CROOKED HOUSE REMEMBERED

"The **Crooked House** was the best, and virtually the last, example of a building seriously affected by coal-mining subsidence in the Black Country. Other examples include: the *Tilted Barrel* public house in Tipton, and *Jurushah Tilted Cottage*, at the Black Country Living Museum. Therefore, this building was architecturally significant and provided tangible evidence of the region's proud industrial past....

The Black Country Society has established a project to capture the lasting legacy of this beloved landmark, provisionally entitled *The Crooked House Remembered*. This will include drawing together a wide range of written and visual material and also an oral history project that will enable memories and reminiscences of the building and all that took place there to be recorded and preserved. Further details will appear on the society's website and social modia in t Staffordshire History Festival is very much to the fore this month.

WCRO Volunteers John Willock and Peter Coulls have been working on the 'Incident Reports' (document series reference CR1499) for some time. The information contained within them provides an insight as to the development of WWII at a local level.

The details they contain relied upon a network of Control Rooms to which Police, Air Raid Wardens and others reported. The accuracy of their reports in some instances have expanded the knowledge of the researchers in certain aspects of WWII and the jargon they used.

In this quarter's Members' Journal **The Midland Ancestor** is a fascinating article about how DNA can help the search for illegitimate ancestors. In *"Filling in the Blank Spaces – How DNA Solved a 130 year old Mystery"* David Kerr tells of his wife's grandmother who was illegitimate and the second of two girls with the middle name of Pye (which was possibly a clue to their father?).

One of the DNA matches had a grandmother with a surname of Pye and this started off his research - leading to a timber merchant in Suffolk as the possible father who probably had *three* different



families running in parallel with each other!

The story is a fascinating one and he has been fortunate to find a wealth of information in his research. He pays

particular tribute to the wills the family made – where wills exist they are often a very valuable source of information about relationships.

FULBOURN HOSPITAL CAMBRIDGE



What caught my eye however was a mention of the admission of one of the family members to **Fulbourn Hospital** in Cambridge as I worked there for a few years in the 1980s. (My office was on the left in the main part of the frontage - on the first floor half hidden by the conifer.)

This has re-ignited my interest in the hospital and who knows I may research the hospital in due course? I well remember the patient records found in the tower with the pigeons and the medical equipment for surgery in the basement. The records are now in the Cambridgeshire Archives in Ely so I will have to pay them a visit.

MIDDLE ENGLAND'S EMPIRE: The Colonial Links of Learnington Spa

Saturday 21 October at 4pm

It is tempting to locate British Imperialism in the territories under British rule and those cities such as London, Liverpool and Bristol, that sat at the centre of imperial trade routes. In so doing, provincial parts of the country tend to slip off the map, as if they were untouched by imperial history.

This talk by **Dr Ben Richardson** of Warwick University uncovers Middle England's empire. Taking Leamington Spa as a case study, he explores how people involved in transatlantic slavery, the East India Company and settler colonialism came to the town and shaped its development.

What have been the legacies of this history and how should we respond to them today?



VIKING DNA

As a result of my piece about the Viking Index on Living DNA a couple of issues ago I received an email:



This is Dr Bernard Juby's DNA haplotype Viking section which confirms that his ancestor was part of the Viking settlement in Normandy before coming over to settle in England after the Conquest.

Very intrigued I asked him for more information and he replied,

"Many decades ago Leicester University were looking for people with rare surnames to undertake a DNA test.

This was part of my result. I presumed that it was a Y 32 DNA which only looks at male relatives. I was impressed by how many wives had remained faithful over the centuries and having the Viking section confirmed the family history.

I now run a Juby Y DNA study as part of GOONS to try & link all of the various known branches of the family now worldwide.

Where having your DNA tested is controlled by

the police so is technically illegal."

The above image is of St Marys Church in Lichfield, in the Neoclassical form of the early 19th century, in a watercolour by W G Herdman.

They have teamed up in a personal capacity to give this talk on the history of the Birmingham


Blitz with reference to a few families affected by it.

Do you know who the first person to be killed in the Blitz was? About the Air Raid Precautions? About Morrison and Anderson shelters? Bomb maps and excavation zones? The talk reminds us of bombed buildings – St Martins Church, the Market Hall and others and goes on to explore the story of Alfred and Mabel Wakeling – Mabel died once but was buried twice due to mistaken identity.

The mother and sister of author Kathleen Dayus were killed by enemy action.

And do you know that sandbags can kill? – three people were killed by sandbags whilst sheltering in an air raid shelter.

Midland Ancestors burial records will feature of course and copies of the book
